Academic

In what has been a long and demanding term there have been a considerable number of academic achievements, too numerous for them all to be mentioned here. Yet there are some that stand out as examples of genuine excellence, worthy of our collective recognition. William Curtis should be congratulated for achieving a grade 9 in his GCSE mathematics examination which he sat during Year 10 we wish him the best of luck with his further maths GCSE this year. In chemistry, Karam Al-Robaie and William Goddard achieved silver awards in the Cambridge Chemistry Challenge.

At the pinnacle of academic endeavor, Jacob Kremer, Alex Cardoza, Dylan Pearson, William Liggett and Karam Al-Robaie put forward an application to Oxford or Cambridge. All the boys should be commended for the time and effort they have put into putting together and preparing for their application. Our best wishes to Karam as he waits to hear feedback from his interview after the Christmas break.

UCAS applications for all Year 13 are well underway and I have been pleased to see the offers flooding in for many with lots of decisions to consider in the Lent Term. Ben van Noort and Cass Stallion and another pupil in Year 13 who achieved a recognised financial qualification in early December successfully sat their Chartered Institute of Securities and Investments Level 2 qualification. They are followed by a year 12 cohort who is now well underway with their studies, aiming to repeat this success in June. Ewan Clark should also be congratulated for the time and effort he put into preparing his application to the Ward and Burke Arkwright Engineering Scholarship.

In maths 55 pupils entered the recent Senior Maths Challenge with Karam Al-Robaie, achieving the best result in the College. Alex Wearne achieved a gold certificate while Jonah Ripley, Alex Cardoza and Ewan Clark achieved bronze certificates.

In Years 9 and 10, the boys have had assessments/exams towards the end of this term and a special mention should go to Thomas Hoskinson who had the top average grade (8/9) in Reeves during the end of term Year 10 examinations.

In September, the winners of the Headmaster's Challenge were announced with Freddie Timlin (Year 9), Eric Wood (Year 10) and Noah Titterton-Manos (Year 11) winners of their respective year groups.

Also earlier in the term, the Immerse Education national essay competition scholarship was won by Alex Wearne. While Hector Lawson was the first Reeves boy to have accumulated 30 reward points. Hector was awarded a café voucher for all his hard work throughout the term so far.

Services

The annual Harvest Appeal for Eastbourne Foodbank started the term with over 2,300 quality meals provided, and this term we introduced our two Chapel Charities – namely Crisis, supporting homeless people and Bushbells, - providing equipment, buildings, and teachers for a school project in Kenya.

This year's Poppy Appeal raised over £900, which is the first time we collected for the Community Christmas Chest - to bring a little

joy in difficult times. In late November the Reeves House Concert raised £415 for challenging MND in support of those affected by Motor Neurone disease. In the summer Oliver Beatton (picture, second left) walked over

110km over six days to raise money for SUDC UK (Sudden Death in Children. To date, Oliver and his three compatriots in Year 11 Craig House have raised just over £4000 for this very worthy cause.

In CCF Reeves Y10 programmes got underway whilst the majority of those who have stayed on for Year 11 are developing the skills of instructing and leading, with a view to future responsibility. On Remembrance Sunday all cadets paid their respects to The Fallen, either at the College or by marching in the town parade and in addition a small number

of enthusiasts enjoyed a cold but enjoyable overnight exercise in late November. Well done must also go to Felix McAndrew, Daniel Caroe and Hector Lawson who were involved in providing the music for the Remembrance Service on Remembrance Sunday.

Year II has focused on the humanitarian role of the Royal Navy with Reuben Mace demonstrating particularly good application of their knowledge to complete the challenges set in assisting the British Virgin Islands in the aftermath of Hurricane Irma.

Beyond CCF, I20 members of the Lower Sixth have been involved in service activities. In Reeves Alex Farlam and Oliver Tutt have been involved in the green team. Ewan Clark, Isaac Ripley, Isaac Ellwood and Alex Wearne have been giving support with maths and languages via Teams to pupils from local secondary schools. While Zizie Ndlovu and Charlie Jenden have been directing Year 9 drama productions.

This term saw our DofE numbers swell with seventy Y10 joining the Silver and eighteen additional Y12 applications for

Gold DofE. During the Oct half-term, William Curtis, Finlay Eadie, Oguz Karaca, James Katz, Reuben Mace and Noah Titterton-Manos were part of a group of fifty-nine YII pupils who completed their practice silver expedition on the South Downs and YI3 pupils Cass Stallion and Karam Al-Robaie (pictured, right) successfully complete their gold assessment on the Brecon Beacons.

Congratulations to Oliver Tutt, Isaac Ripley, Alex Wearne and Zizie Ndlovu who were awarded their Silver Duke of Edinburgh's Award. 



Not only have the 1st XV won 10 from 13 this term, including a satisfying win over Brighton College, but also enjoyed a second consecutive successful run in

The two College football teams have played in five competitive friendly matches this term in readiness for the full season in January.

At the start of this term, the U17 Cricket XI (pictured, below) competed

in the plate final against Stowe. After a tough first game in the cup the U17XI ended

up on the wrong end of the result, they were matched against Eton in the last 16 of the plate. After a long bus journey, they arrived and battled hard ending up in a convincing victory. They then faced Lords Wandsworth at home and with confidence growing the team restricted the opposition to under 200 sending themselves through to the semi-finals. The boy's Ist hockey team competed in the Indoor County Tournament, which was hosted at the College. The boys played some great hockey but miss out on advancing to the regional finals.


