

Academic

Always the marathon term, not only in length, but in the amount of course content covered, the boys have done well to grind through the past sixteen weeks with industry and purpose. Gearing up for formal assessment has been the theme for YII and YI3 in particular. With both year groups having their sights set firmly on their mock exams which fall on 8th-18th January (YII) and 19th to 23rd February (YI3). I have spoken to both year groups and they should have revision plans drafted up for the Christmas holidays and beyond. U6th boys have focused unwaveringly on UCAS applications this term and thankfully, all have met the deadline, hence they are seeing some motivational offers start to wing their way to them, which is excellent to hear. A few key messages that Miss Gordon (Head of Futures) asked me to pass on below:

Y13 Parents

UCAS application forms have been of excellent quality. Once they have been sent, universities will reply via UCAS Track. Universities have until 16 May to respond. It's a long game. There is lots of revision support available in Unifrog to support mock revision plans over Christmas and into next term.

Y12 Parents

Regular exploration is the best way for pupils to work out what the best next step for them is. Use Unifrog as a starting point. See Satchel One for more information or the Y12 Futures Team. Futures Convention on Friday I March 2024 from 7pm to 9pm. Please do support this if you can by offering to come and represent your career pathway. The more pathways children hear about, the better.

At the time of writing Bob Zhao and previous Head of House, Ben Hutt, have gone through the rigorous interview process and are waiting to hear back from St Catherine's Oxford, and Teddy Hall Oxford respectively. We wish them the best of luck with anticipation of results in early January. Whatever the outcome, to have got to the selection stage is very commendable.

The term has seen plenty of academic trips including a very successful VI form Politics trip to Westminster. One particular highlight for Year 9 pupils was a trip to the Towner Art Gallery to see the Turner Prize finalists. 
It has also




