Next term will see more of the art and photography displayed. This term saw a succession of informal concerts which included the talents of **Atom Tian** on the piano and **Samuel Lee** on the





drums. There was also a composers concert where **Leo Makarov** showcased a piece of house music which immediately transported everyone to Cafe del Mar in Ibiza. In drama, **Harry Heming** performed his GCSE piece at the Charity Concert. **Henry Tang** and **Oliver Du Feu** were very entertaining in the Art's Gold production of *Heathers*, directed by U6th pupils.











As mentioned above, the last night of term saw the A Cappella contest return. It really is a remarkable evening of varied songs and incredible quality, especially given that most of the participants only usually sing in the shower and put the songs together with very limited guidance from the music department. This year *Ain't no sunshine* by Bill Withers was the choice and the boys produced a high quality rendition. **Oliver Du Feu, Aidan Yao** and **Alex Chapman** provided the melody and managed to count the 'I knows' correctly (if you know you know, as it were). Deep and resonant bass was provided by **Luke Clifford, Ed Rowell** and **Emmanuel Bawa.** The other group members blended beat boxing, harmonies and foot-stamping to create a simple, but very effective, sound.





Sport Review

School matches were played in seventeen sports this term, despite there only being five weekends at school. The 350 fixtures have ensured that 85% of pupils have now represented the College this year. Gonville were represented in all teams, down to the 4th XI football and the U14D hockey. Special mention must be made of the U15D hockey squad that included no less than 7 Gonvillians as they lost a thrilling 6-5 match against Hurstpierpoint. Three of those had not played a fixture for the College before - a proper introduction!

Emmanuel Bawa played for the 1st XI, scoring crucial goals as they played out some high scoring and entertaining fixtures. The side averaged 3.5 goals a game. In fact, across all teams over 150 goals were scored. The U15A, including Rowley Emus, went unbeaten on Saturdays.



In football, **Luke Burnham** captained the 1st XI, with **Luke Clifford** and **Finn McKeown** also regularly turning out for the top team. **Harry Heming** and **Oliver Bearcroft** played in the U16A. The weather played havoc with the first half of the season, but fixtures were played against Cranleigh, Bede's, Charterhouse, Worth, Tonbridge and Brighton. Despite it being January, a sizeable contingent continued to play 15-a-side rugby under the lights at Horsham. **Edward Rowell**, **William Daniels** and **Max**





Crowther represented the 1stXV. After half term the attention switched to Sevens and the challenge of Rosslyn Park. **Barley O'Conor** scored four tries in the Colts tournament groups stages as the U16s narrowly missed out on the second day.

In tennis, Gonvillians found success in the Winter League with **Finn McKeown**, **Harry Heming** and **Oliver Bearcroft** winning through the to regional finals day. It was also note-worthy that in the first round of the U18 National Cup, a team made entirely of Gonvillians tasted victory. In this case **Shin Kawagoe**, **Nazarii Dmyterchuk**, **Finn McKeown** and **Oliver Bearcroft**. Nazarii must

also be congratulated for winning a trip to the prestigious Raphael Nadal Academy this Easter. As has become traditional, there is a healthy Gonville contingent in the basketball team as well, with **Aidan Yao**, **Daniel Li**, **Adrian Chan** and **Ryan Liu** all playing multiple fixtures.

Gonville hockey this term was characterised by stout defence. Goals were not too forthcoming, but two notable strikes from **Rowley Emus** and a couple of no-score draws saw the year 10 squad to 4th place. The year 9 and seniors also proved tough to beat and, if the seniors hadn't spurned some excellent chances they might even have claimed a prized Craig scalp.



House water polo returned after a long hiatus and proved an immediate hit. The junior squad was comprised of year 9 and 10. After losing a really close tussle to Craig, despite some outstanding defence from **Alex Chapman** and the speed of **Lucas Gorrill** in midfield, they triumphed over Pennell to secure a spot in the 3rd/4th place match against Wargrave. Early goals from **Max Colvin** and tenacity from **Rowley Emus** saw them through to victory.





The senior squad didn't concede until the final in a series of dominant displays. Speed through the water, teamwork and some excellent saves from **William Daniels** proved too much for their opponents. The



work rate of **Matthew Geddes** and **Harry Prescott**, as well as the golden arm of **Finn McKeown** deserve particular mention as they dismantled Powell to win the title.


