
#### **Creative Arts**

The music department has been hugely busy with over twenty different musical events this term including a vocal masterclass with international opera singer and OE Mark LE Brocq as part of the Creative Arts Circus week. Jazz and singer song writers in the Undercroft was back, as was the prep school orchestra day and the hugely impressive Summer Concert in All Saints' Church, featuring the choir, symphony orchestra, soloists and the jazz band, with some well-known film favourites, including Gladiator, Jurassic Park and the Pirates of the Caribbean. The Young Musician of the Year Competition was extremely competitive and was won by Matthew Wakefield.



In DT our Year 9 and 10 scholars have been designing frames for micro-drones. The College has recently







begun rehearsal for a prep school tour of the Lion. The Witch and the Wardrobe.

In art this term, pupils were invited to meet Lindy Dunbar, a local artist who demonstrated some of her painting techniques for pupils to incorporate into their own practice. Meanwhile Junior art scholars and Year 9 pupils also produced some excellent ceramic work to be displayed along the South Downs as part of the Platinum Jubilee celebrations.





#### Service

The College's spirit of service has remained undaunted this term.

Around school and in chapel, charity giving continued this term. Overall this year, individual houses, and the school more widely have done great work in fund-raising - and our total of approx. £18,000 in giving this year takes us back towards our pre-COVID levels of engagement. Our thanks to all members of the charity society, staff, pupils and parents in their support this academic year.

In the CCF, the term began with those successful Year 11s completing the Army Section's Leadership Development Programme, many receiving promotion to Lance Corporal. My congratulations to Alex Davies who promoted to Corporal. RAF cadets participated in the first RAF camp in 3 years, whilst the CCFY10 activity week included an overnight exercise, survival skills, fieldcraft, water sports and trip to London, Portsmouth Historical Dockyards and as RAF base.



Again we were proud to see achieve out 60% completion rate of all levels of the Duke of Edinburgh award's, unprecedented in the South East given that nearly all our pupils are direct entry. At the end of term, 63 pupils embarked on the next stage of their expeditions to the New Forest and Wales, with significant number of Powell boys involved.



## **Sport**

We have seen 20 sports competing through the year. 90%, or 580 pupils competed for the College's 100+ teams in over 700 fixtures. A huge thanks to the ground staff, house, medical, catering, bursarial, transport, foundation and marketing staff, for all their vital but unseen support.

In boys cricket, the hard work during the winter nets paid off. The Ist XI have once again played some very exciting cricket with victories over Whitgift, twice, winning 7 of 9 Saturday fixtures on a very strong circuit. The 2nd XI enjoyed 7 wins from II and were crowned the inaugural County 2nd XI champions in a thrilling final. The 3rd XI and 4th XI played six games with two wins for the 3rd XI. The UI7s beat Eton in the quarter final of the national 35 over competition. The UI6s won 3 from 5 and played some exciting cricket, showing great depth in the talent ranks. The UI5As had a hugely successful season making two finals and winning one ECB UI5 national cup county final, which took them to the regional playoff. The UI5Bs recorded the most successful season of any boys team with six wins from 7, well done to the squad and those who played in the C team. The UI4 teams all worked hard during the season and will be looking to continue to improve over the winter to be more competitive next year.

The tennis teams have had an outstanding summer term yet again and I congratulate all the boys who were in action on the courts over the summer. The UI6 boys won in the College's first Sussex title and then they finished runner's up in the LTA county round. The UI8 boys also finished runners in the county competition. In the first week of the holidays, squads played in the Independent Schools finals at Eton College with Reha Akinlosotu reaching the Quarter Finals in the Springthorpe Cup. The athletics team had a highly successful Sussex Schools diamond league season, with Jasper Simpson being the highlight of the season with a 800m gold medal.





Wilf Batham-Read is included in the Harlequins U18 rugby squad, whilst Ollie Wigman tours with Canada Rugby U18 over the summer months.

Matthew Clark has continued to make a splash in the College pool, but also on the national stage. We wish him the very best as he competes in the English Nationals (200m individual medley and 100m butterfly) and the British Championships (50m butterfly) this summer.


