During the course of the term, there have been examples of outstanding academic achievement and effort that deserve our collective recognition. Year 13 have been receiving plenty of offers from their UCAS applications and are working towards their firm and insurance options ahead of the 8th of June deadline.

In January, pupils in Year II sat their mock GCSE exams with a level of performance that bodes very well for the summer. The top performer in Reeves and one of the top performers in the College was Noah Titterton-Manos with an average score of 8 or above. January also brought news of offers from Oxbridge and we congratulate Karam Al-Robaie on his offer to read Mathematics at Jesus College Oxford. In February the Year 13 boys sat their mock exams. 

The house chess team managed to produce another strong performance but this year they were unable to go all the way but a strong third-place finish contributed vital points to the house cause. Well done to Daniel Caroe, Freddie Timlin, Alex Wearne and Karam Al-Robaie who were part of the team. Match reports from the quarter-final and semi-final fixtures are detailed below.

Quarterfinal - Reeves against Craig was slightly rugby-delayed but both teams play pretty fast and furious, so their games ended well before many others. On board 3 (Freddie v Orlando) and board 2 (Alex v Matteo) Craig put up a good fight but was eventually overwhelmed by

the Reeves players. Board I was the last of the three to finish and Victor (playing black for Craig) held a clear advantage over Karam for much of the middle game. However, he had to deal with a messy, complex position and a dangerous double rook attack from Karam and couldn't quite see how to defend it accurately. Suddenly his queen was lost and a few moves later, Victor resigned.

Semi-final - Reeves v Pennell - Board 1: Alex v Pieter (White)

An aggressive game and both players brought their queens out early. Alex left it a little too long to castle and Pieter checked the king – leaving a black rook trapped in the corner (see diagram below). Pieter thought he'd seen a queen sacrifice that would see Alex checkmated but Alex found the only move to defend. This gave him the chance to win a rook for a knight, but he was running out of pawns! There was a clever pin on the pawn protecting the black king at one end, but a knight and queen attack at the other meant both players were fighting for their lives! Alex forced a queen swap and now the endgame started with Alex a rook up but Pieter with three extra pawns. If he could queen them the game would be over – however, Alex was solid in defence and Pieter couldn't see any option to break through. Finally, after 75 minutes the players needed to leave, and it went to a judge's decision. The extra material for black and the lack of opportunity for white to queen a pawn gave the victory to Reeves.

Board 2: **Karam** (White) v Victor - An early queen swap led rapidly into the middle game. A neat knight attack from Karam (on white) won two pawns and undermined the fianchettoed bishop protecting Victor's king. That knight, supported by a bishop, caused Victor no end of problems and since Karam hadn't castled, he was able to push a pawn with rook protection all the way to h6, only blocked by the trapped black king. However, Karam's unconventional position meant that when Victor managed to hold off the attack the game was very evenly matched, even with a slight material advantage to white. Karam's king was horribly exposed and suddenly Victor found a bishop fork (that would have won his knight) and Karam resigned.

Board 3: Freddie v Cedric (White)

Cedric was able to build a quick advantage on this board and his queen and rook rapidly invaded the seventh rank. This was impossible for Freddie to defend, and his king was trapped – checkmate.
